INTRODUCTION

Every year South Tyneside Young People's Parliament (STYPP) plan and deliver a campaign based on the local results of the annual national Make Your Mark survey of young people's views. The most popular issue for young people in South Tyneside in 2021, and the topic for STYPP's latest campaign, was Domestic Abuse (DA).

Although there was some initial trepidation when the result was announced, STYPP members quickly embraced this campaign and dedicated themselves to finding out as much as they could about this sensitive and challenging topic. COVID restrictions were another factor to contend with this year; STYPP negotiated this by switching from face-toface events to virtual borough-wide school meetings, online questionnaires, and a 'week of action' designed to be delivered within individual school settings.



CAMPAIGN PROGRESS | JAN - NOVEMBER 2021





JANUARY - MARCH

Education and understanding

The first task at the beginning of our campaign was to educate ourselves on the topic. We did this by reaching out to local Domestic Abuse (DA) services and DA professionals for information, advice and guidance. We met with these professionals via virtual meetings to find out more about their roles in relation to domestic abuse. They also provided training sessions for us to gain a better understanding of the topic and formed a domestic abuse subgroup.

The professional we contacted also agreed to form a campaign sub-group. This was a new development for a STYPP campaign which became a fantastic resource; to inform our work, ensure all the information we circulated was current and correct, and to provide expert input to help shape our ideas. Working with the sub-group also gave us a strong link into how local services are delivered and developed, and ensured our views and opinions were also listened to and informed practice. For example, the introduction of an evaluation form to be used when Northumbria Police's Education Team are delivering workshops to assess their performance.

APRIL-MAY

Survey

To launch our campaign, we designed a survey for secondary school students, and teaching staff in both primary and secondary schools. The purpose of the survey was to find out what students and teaching staff knew about DA, if there are any gaps in their knowledge, what training they'd received, and what support they knew was available.

JUNE

Feedback to schools

As COVID restrictions had prevented our usual campaign events, we organised a 'virtual meeting' with all our secondary schools. This meeting was used to inform young people, and schools across the borough, of the early stages of the campaign, the questionnaire and survey results, and our campaign plans. It was also a really valuable opportunity to hear from young people not involved directly in the campaign; to hear their views on the topic, their reaction to the survey results and their ideas for developing the campaign.

JULY-AUGUST

Campaign materials and resources

We spent the summer break meeting 'Domestic Abuse' professionals who helped us develop lesson plans designed to help schools address this topic. These included 5 x lesson plans and can be accessed via our web page http://www.southtyneside.gov.uk/stypp

Planning – we also spent time planning our 'Domestic Abuse Awareness Week' and designed all of the resources to support this week. This included: a 'before and after' activity, a task around exploring definitions of abuse, a 'Clue card' activity, and a Domestic Abuse debate.

Bit of fun! - Don't worry though, we did also manage to have a bit of fun! We enjoyed a Kayaking session and some delicious fish and chips on South Shields sea front at the end of the summer holidays!







CAMPAIGN PROGRESS | CONTINUED

SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER

Attended the 'Domestic Abuse Partnership Board'

Wow, we attended the 'Domestic Abuse Partnership' board to tell them about our campaign and plans. They were very impressed with our work and even included our work and survey findings in the 'Domestic Abuse Strategy 2021'.

Time to register

We invited schools to join us at another 'virtual meeting' to tell them what we'd been up to and invite them to register to take part in our DA Awareness Week.

We also played a little quiz, just for fun!

We were delighted to have all our secondary schools on the call and that they all signed up to be part of our awareness week.





NOVEMBER

Time to deliver

At the beginning of November all of our secondary schools received the STYPP designed resources to participate in the awareness week.

Electronic copies resources were emailed and hard copies were hand delivered.

The packs included:

- 'Let's look after ourselves and each other' document – (to be shared with students prior to taking part in any activities)
- Links to useful websites and resources this includes
 - 5 x lesson plans written by STYPP members
- Evaluation for staff and pupils taking part in workshops
- Social media profile picture and cover image
 - Screen image to add to school TV screens

VIRTUAL DEBATE!

We organised a 'virtual debate' for representatives from all of our secondary schools to join. The students who attended came up with some fantastic arguments for the statements we provided.

Statement 1 - Domestic violence only happens between adults

"Children are also victims even if it isn't physical, emotionally they can be affected."

"It can happen whether you're a boyfriend/ girlfriend or not, it doesn't have to be physical."

"Children aren't mature enough to be in a relationship and therefore don't experience domestic abuse"

Statistically 74.5% of violence is [experienced by] children, so I disagree.

Statement 2 - You shouldn't report domestic violence, you will only make things worse

"You should always report it before it gets worse, let friends / family know what is going on"

"2014 survival rate for victims of Domestic Violence was 74%, so this just shows something can be done and it should be reported."

"It's no one else's business what goes on behind closed doors"

"No matter what the circumstances, it could be someone's life. The more time you waste it could be someone's life.

Be fast."

Statement 3 - It's not domestic abuse if it doesn't involve physical abuse

"It is, there are different types, physical, sexual, emotional, psychological etc."

"That statement is incorrect there are a lot of types of abuse it doesn't have to just be physical"

"Words can tarnish the thoughts of oneself. You will eventually be left feeling like you have no self-worth."

DOMESTIC ABUSE AWARENESS WEEK

STAFF TRAINING

South Tyneside Safeguarding Children and Adults Partnership (STSCAP) offered a 'twilight' training session for staff (in addition to their existing training programme) on Wednesday 17th November, ahead of the awareness week. This was attended by 8 professionals who received education and awareness on DA.

SURVEY RESULTS

To launch their campaign, STYPP developed and designed a survey that was circulated across all secondary school students in South Tyneside, as well as teachers from both primary and secondary school settings. The purpose of the survey was to find out what students and teaching staff knew about 'Domestic Abuse' and if there are any gaps in their knowledge, and the support available. We were so pleased with the response rate! Our survey was completed by 567 young people and 185 teaching staff (see domestic abuse survey report for full details of findings: https://www.southtyneside.gov.uk/article/73958/Domestic-Abuse-Campaign.


The survey covered a number of key issues relating to DA, including: basic knowledge and understanding of DA, the availability of information and training, support for young people and staff, service available to young people, and issues relating to reporting DA.

Here's just some of our results and what this told us:

Young people's results showed that only a quarter of students feel they have received enough education in domestic abuse and 41% report they haven't received any.

Action: STYPP to develop a set of lesson plans and support materials for students and staff to use as part of a 'Domestic Awareness Week'

SURVEY RESULTS

33% of staff told us they hadn't received any training and 38% said training received was over 3 years ago. This equates to 71% of staff without up-to-date training.

Action: South Tyneside Safeguarding Children and Adults Partnership (STSCAP) will add an additional regular twilight training session onto their existing training programme and promote this across schools to boost uptake and introduce new materials that will raise awareness of the support available.

59% of young people and 49% of staff weren't aware of any support services available.

Action: STYPP members to work with 'Domestic Abuse' partners in the borough to create new materials that will raise awareness of the support available





"The findings of the STYPP survey clearly show that knowledge and awareness of domestic abuse, and how to respond, can be improved. The Young People's Parliament have developed a range of actions to address awareness, knowledge gaps, information about services, local data and reporting procedures. This work is highlighted in our Domestic Abuse Strategy and will also be an integral part of our considerations and plans and responsibilities moving forward. In particular, the need for more awareness raising sessions and the development and access to relevant training for our partner agencies.

The local work on domestic abuse and the specific campaign work led by STYPP were all included in a report presented to South Tyneside Borough Council in November 2021. This report was very well received and increased awareness of our domestic abuse challenge, but also the excellent partnership underway to promote happy and healthy relationships, and prevent domestic abuse.

SUMMARY

This report marks the end of another successful STYPP campaign. Our young people overcame their initial trepidation around addressing such a sensitive topic to deliver a thoughtful and dynamic campaign driven by young people's voices. STYPP were again the engine room of the campaign, but wider representation and influence was achieved through some fantastic borough-wide secondary school virtual events, and also through the expertise and enthusiasm of the sub-group of DA professional (a new addition to the STYPP approach to campaigns).

STYPP's influence was felt across a range of agencies, including: South Tyneside Safeguarding Children and Adults Partnership (who provided additional training in response to the DA survey results), Northumbria Police (who were guided by STYPP in their promotion and delivery of DA sessions with young people), and South Tyneside Council (who have included the DA survey report in their JSNA, and supported the campaign through STYPP's regular inclusion in their Safeguarding Board)

STYPP certainly met their aim of raising awareness of 'Domestic Abuse' across the population of young people in South Tyneside. One of the main legacies of the campaign is the development of a set of DA resources that were made available to all schools for the borough-wide DA Awareness Week, and are now available on the council website for anyone to use.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As a result of this campaign, we recommend the following five key actions to increase awareness and understanding of Domestic Abuse, to promote the support and guidance available, and to respond to the issues raised in our survey of students and staff:

- **1.**The DA Handbook/Service Directory is updated to include a specific section that directs young people to services relevant to them.
- 2. 'Domestic Abuse' awareness week becomes an annual event delivered by secondary schools and youth groups to raise awareness and promote sources of support
 - 3. That the domestic abuse board has a young person's representative
- 4. South Tyneside Safeguarding Children and Adults Partnership (STSCAP) add regular twilight training sessions to their existing training programme and promote this across schools to boost uptake
- **5.** All schools review their approach to 'domestic abuse', including their approach to awareness raising and signposting, and how it is embedded within the curriculum.
